Explore the world of science and engineering. Use these resources to help students understand the design process and learn about the connection between engineering and the things we use in everyday life.



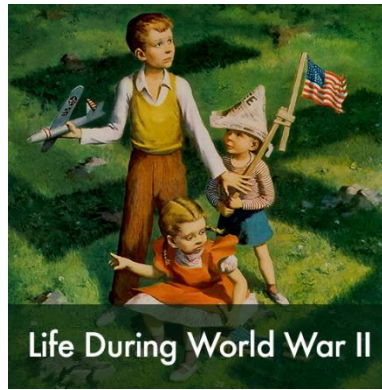

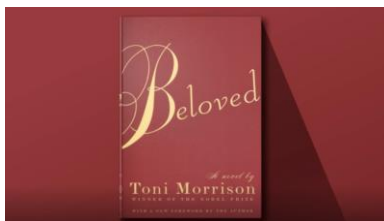

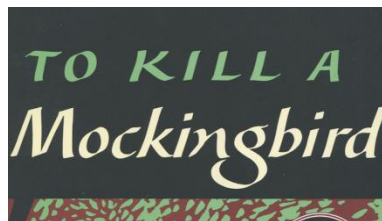
